

## From the Presbytery of Western New York Anti-Racism Task Group

## Seeking to be an Anti-Racist: Living the Love of Jesus Black American History is American History

To understand the work of Anti-Racism and to be authentic in it, it is vital that one have a full and accurate understanding of the history of the United States and the experiences of all of its people. There are white people who would claim that there is nothing significantly wrong with how the history of the United States is taught in our school. They would argue that the enslavement of Black people is discussed and that once the enslaved were freed, and allowed to become citizens, their story is simply part of the general narrative that is currently taught. But the truth is that the experience of White Americans that is taught in our schools is very different from that of Black Americans. And if the truth of the Black American experience is not accurately understood, a White person cannot understand the issues being presented today by Anti-racism scholars and activists, both Black and White.

For example, some argue that enslavement of Black Africans was simply typical of the times (17-19th century). But research has proven that the theories of the racial inferiority of Africans were created to justify enslavement for economic gain. Did you know that Reconstruction failed, not because Black Americans didn't have the skills to prosper after slavery, but because Southern White Democrats used all of their political power to stop their progress? Jim Crow laws were the result. Also, there were over 4,000 lynchings from the end of Reconstruction until the 1950's yet it was not until the 21st century that this country could finally pass an Anti-lynching bill. Did you know that the vast majority of Black GI's did not receive the benefits of the GI bill? Are you aware of how red-lining limited further limited the economic advancement of Black American families?

To understand American history, we need to understand the history of all Americans. This doesn't just mean adding the experiences of Black Americans, their achievements and their incredible perseverance. This means also understanding the actions of White Americans and how that affected the experiences of other Americans. This, of course, includes Asian Americans, Native Americans or Indigenous People, Latinos and more. To understand American History, we must know the full story. Today, we will start with the African American story.

There are numerous resources to help, but the easiest is perhaps You-Tube. There are several series on Youtube. One is Crash Course Black History. Dr. Henry Louis Gates all of which are helpful. Take some time to begin to learn this history, because it is the history of all Americans.

## A Brief History of the Hamburg Presbyterian Church



The First Free Will Baptist Church of Hamburg was organized in 1826, and met for a time in the school house, in private homes, and in an old store near where Kronenberg's now stands. It was built a house of worship in 1830, at a cost of \$1000. The structure was on the location now occupied by St. Peter and St. Paul's Roman Catholic Church. In 1845 a new building was erected at the corner of Lake Street and Linwood Avenue, again at a cost of \$1000. The first building was sold to the Roman Catholic Church was used by them until 1863, when it was moved to East Main Street opposite Newton Road, where it is still standing, used as a residence.

The building on Lake Street served the Baptist Church for over forty years, with some enlargements. In the late eighties, however, the Free Will Baptist Church had fallen on hard times, and in 1888 a group of them petitioned the Presbytery of Buffalo to be received as a Presbyterian Church. On June 19 of that year the Presbytery met here and organized the Westminster Presbyterian Church of Hamburg. The First Ruling Elders were Elisha Thurston and Clinton T. Fish. In July the new congregation was formally merged with the old Baptist congregation, under the name "Lake Street Presbyterian Church of Hamburg."

The Church had 18 members at its reception by the Presbytery. It had grown to 70 by 1896. The membership was 305 at the start of the present pastorate, and now stands at 710. It had been necessary to enlarge the building taken over from the Baptist group, but it steadily became more and more crowded, so that it became clear that a new building was a vital necessity. An initial start in this direction was the purchase of the lot on Main Street in 1931. The house there was used as a Manse until 1950, when a new Manse was built on Center Street to prepare this site for the building of a Church. Committees for the building program were set up in 1946; financial campaigns were conducted in 1948, 1950, and 1951. The old building was sold to Grace Lutheran Church - so that it is now serving its third congregation.

Ground was broken for this building on March 23, 1952, and the Cornerstone was laid on October 12. 1952. The first services were held here on June 14, 1953. The Sunday Church School held its Children's Day Service at 9:15am, with an attendance of 365, and the Worship Service at 11:00am had an attendance of 514. The following Sunday the first Celebration of the Holy Communion in the new building had 261 Communicants.

Pastor Rachel indicated that there have been no baptisms or funerals conducted. Only one wedding is in the planning for July. Rachel is now actively moderating the Session oif East Aurora Presbyterian Church as they search for an interim pastor.

## CLERK'S REPORT:

Tony Cimorelli reported that the annual Necrology Report submission requested by Presbytery has been completed for Hamburg Presbyterian Church. The names of two past Elders were submitted, James Beatty and Virginia Calkins.

## **DEACON'S REPORT:**

Terry Vogler provided the Deacons Report. Highlighted several programs and activities including the transportation program for Sandy Mallon, the card writing campaign and the Easter flower project.

## COMM. TO PRESBYTERY:

The next Presbytery Meeting is not until May 2022, (Olean NY if in person). No representative required at this time. Note: A mini Presbytery meeting is being planned for April 30, 2022 via ZOOM from 10am-12pm. Clerk of Session training will be provided.

## TREASURER'S REPORT:

Blair circulated report via email. No major items to be highlighted. Jerry spoke in Blair's absence and indicated he will be delivering the Stewardship moment this Sunday. Jerry also indicated all key performance indicators are good at this time.

MINISTRY TEAMS REQUIRING ACTION:

The following motions were presented by Ministry Teams and approved by Session

MOTION: Building and Grounds makes a motion to allow the Ruth Circle to use the church Lounge on the 3rd Wednesday of every month from 12:30-2:30pm. Motion approved.

MOTION: B&G moves to added \$5,000 to the Physical Plant Maintenance budget line item. Motion approved.

## **OLD BUSINESS**

Reviewed the revised building use guidelines statement from February 2022. Tony to work with Mary in the office to update website.

## **NEW BUSINESS:**

No new business was mentioned this month.

Open discussion took place. Christian Education team spoke to the successful Home Again Refugee resettlement project. Worship and Music updated all on the Lenton and Easter season preparations. Church Life spoke to the summer annual picnic planning efforts and the planned resumption of Sunday coffee hours in April. Pastor Rachel provided a status on the effort shape and structure the anticipated sabbatical that is in planning. The Lily grant for funding that is being pursued is due for submission on April 23, 2022.






