# East Side Garden Walk Beauty and Pride

Once again Gardens of Buffalo Niagara has presented the East Side Garden Walk. The organizers of the event explain that the walk offers opportunities for residents to share not just their gardens, but also their stories of perseverance and to take control of the narrative of their community.

Participants toured all over the East Side, viewing lovely gardens, being welcomed by gracious hosts and discovering remnants of the beautiful Olmsted Park system (1895) such as the Martin Luther King Jr. Park. In the early 19<sup>th</sup> century, the Erie Canal made Buffalo one of the richest cities on the frontier. Landscape architect Frederick Olmsted was hired to create a dramatic system of parks and parkways including the Humboldt Parkway which became known as one of the most beautiful parkways in the U.S. But the beauty of the city was not intended for all residents. Redlining (https://www.wkbw.com/news/national/two-americas/redlining-how-racial-discrimination-hobbled-black-homeownership-in-buffalo) forced most Black families to live east of Main Street where white-controlled banks refuse to lend money. Then, government agencies run by white residents destroyed the Humboldt Parkway, the jewel of Buffalo's park system, to build a highway in a pit, the 33. They ruined the parkway and the neighborhood.

The residents on the East Side were stuck in place. With limited financing available, the housing could not be maintained. Even today Black residents that are fully employed and have paid off their home, can have trouble getting a home improvement loan. So, residents of the East Side are working to reclaim the beauty that was so carelessly destroyed. For the Black and Latino residents, "gardening is an act of defiance," says Christopher Maag of the Rochester Democrat and Chronicle.

In these circumstances, "gardening becomes a way to assert one's humanity in dehumanizing conditions" says Kenneth Helphand in his book "Defiant Gardens." These gardens are statements of beauty and pride in circumstances that do not encourage creativity and wonder. But these gardens do. In addition to the Garden Walk, a Children' Garden Festival was held. At this event, backpacks filled with school supplies were passed out to area children. In the aftermath of the 5/14 terrorism at the local Tops Market, this was a sign of caring and hope for the children in the neighborhood. Over 200 backpacks were distributed. Several of the churches in the Presbytery donated to this program.

This walk, and the festival, are an annual event and you are encouraged to attend next year (July 22-23, 2023) to celebrate the resiliency and strength of the residents of the East Side and the beauty that has been created there.

A motion was made to name Church Officers for the 2022-2023 fiscal year.

MOTION to approve the 2022-2023 officers of Hamburg Presbyterian Church as follows:

President – Chair of Financial Management – Jerry Stitt; VP Chair of Building & Grounds - ; Treasure is the Treasurer – Blair Webster; Secretary is the Clerk – Tony Cimorelli. The motion was approved unanimously.

### PASTOR'S REPORT:

Pastor Rachel reported that she is in touch with the In touch with Schmittendorf's about baptizing their baby Benjamin. A date has yet to be determined. Pastor will lead Worship on August 258, 2022 but will be out of town on September 4, 2022. Pastor Drew Ludwig will lead Worship on that Sunday. Pastor Rachel also mentioned there has been no new developments in the Lily grant process for the potential sabbatical funding she applied for.

### CLERK'S REPORT:

Tony reported that Pastor Rachel married Lisa Cimorelli and Ivan Delgado at Westminster Presbyterian Church on July 2, 2022. He reminded Session that a motion was approved by email for the official transfer on Bridgette Books to the Sardinia United Methodist Church on July 1, 2022. He informed new Elders that it is common practice share committee reports with all Session members prior to the meeting. He also informed Session of a nice circumstance where HPC was contacted by Alyssa Canfield, (Nee Denzel) from Connecticut requesting documentation of her baptism in 1985. BY researching the archives in the tower, he was able to find documentation that in fact Ms. Canfield was baptized at HPC. He provided a letter to her stating that Alyssa Brooke Kari Denzel, daughter of Larry John and Patricia Diane, was baptized in the Hamburg Presbyterian Church by Reverend Edwin H. Sprague on November 10, 1985. We were happy we could accommodate!

### DEACON'S REPORT:

Melissa Ferraro presented the Deacon's report. She mentioned that the new committee members were present in the last meeting. The card list and visitation list updates were updated. Terry Vogler volunteered to due poinsettias this year. Deacons will bring disposable cups of communion to home bound or nursing homes members. She also led a conversation

# MINUTES OF SPECIAL SESSION MEETING AUGUST 18th 2022

The Rev. Rachel Brown, Moderator, called the meeting to order with prayer at 6:11 p.m. A quorum was present. The agenda was approved as written. Elders in attendance were:

Attendees: Pastor Rachel, Jeff Leyonmark, Kris McGuire, Wayne Hines, Tom Tabone, Sandy Smith, Jerry Stitt, Tony Cimorelli - Clerk

Excused: Tricia Harrigan, Chris Burns, Blair Webster, Jim Sampson, Hollis Bahruth

The purpose of this special Session meeting was to the discuss potential parking lot repair using funds from the Church reserves.

The motion was put forth by Building & Grounds:

**MOTION**: "Building and Grounds requests funds to replace the blacktop from the Northeast corner of the rear entrance (the narrow section) to Union Street. Sum total of \$8,781."

The motion passed unanimously.

Discussion that preceded the motion vote included.

A clarification that the section of parking lot to be repaired was only for the 265 x 20 area that connects to Union Street.

The proposal language regarding "not responsible for cracking in resurfaced drive due to previous cracking in existing drive" was discussed extensively. In the end it was deemed standard with all contractors and this is the 3rd time for us using this paving company. He track record and reputation honorable and Buildings and Grounds indicated they were comfortable with him and this language.

Additional bids are still being received to seal the strip from Main Street to the nursery school wing. It was also clarified that we do not need to repave that section, only stripe and seal.

Session was reminded that this is a three phase process and this is the first phase. Future phases will be handled in a similar manner and could last until late 2023 or 2024.

Several Session member supported the idea of trying to do all three phases now, but it was not recommended considering all the other church financial priorities at this time.

Session suggests that a solicitation of the congregation for additional funds to offset the money required from church reserved be conducted.

Session was reminded that any church officer could sign the contract and it does not have to be solely the president.

MOTION to adjourn was approved unanimously.

Joys & Concerns were lifted, and Pastor Rachel closed the meeting at 7:02 p.m. with prayer.


